

Community Researchers Q&A Fact Sheet

What does the job involve?

After attending training, you will be designing ways to interview people in the local community and collecting their thoughts, opinions and ideas about the collection at Dulwich Picture Gallery. You will usually work as a team of 3 community researchers in each session. You will then work as a group to collate all the research gathered from these community sessions and feed back to the project team.

Your knowledge of your local area and the people who live there will be very important: you will be able to identify opportunities and places to talk to people yourself.

Will I get any training?

You will receive training to enable you to take up the role with confidence. This will include training in Community Research approaches and facilitation and communication skills. The training will be provided by **Shortwork** and Dulwich Picture Gallery. At the end of the contract you will also be invited to attend a next steps meeting and receive information and support on what you can do next.

How many hours will I work?

We imagine that most Community Researchers will work around 10-12 days between June 2022 and January 2023 including training sessions. These will be a mixture of full or half day sessions. You will also need to be available for the following dates and times:-

- Recruitment and Selection Day: Wednesday 8 June 10.00am-13.30pm
- Training Days: Wednesday 22 June, Thursday 23 June, Wednesday 6 July, Thursday 7 July 10.00am to 5.00pm.

Hours will be flexible after the training and may include working during the evenings and at weekends.

How much will I be paid?

This is a freelance role which is paid at £100 a day (£50 for a half day). We can support with advice on how to work and invoice as a freelancer.

Where will I work?

Training, meeting and reporting on your work will take place at Dulwich Picture Gallery and in commuity settings. Community Research sessions will take place across Southwark, Lambeth and Lewisham. Your work will mainly be in public places and spaces. You will also have free entry to the collection and exhibition at the Gallery.

Who can be a Community Researcher?

Many different types of people become community researchers. They can be anyone aged over 18, some have links to the community through volunteering or work experience while others live or attended school in the local area. Some have previous experience of community research and may speak a community language, but this is not essential.

How do I find out more?

- 3. Tell us a little bit about your local community/where you live. What is important to people there?
- 4. How do you think you would ensure equal opportunities in this role?
- 5. What best describes your connection to the communities of Southwark, Lambeth or Lewisham?
- Are you available to attend the recruitment day on Wednesday 8 June 10.00 to 1.30pm and the training days on Wednesday 22 June, Thursday 23 June, Wednesday 6 July, Thursday 7 July 10.00am to 5.00pm.

If applying via video or PowerPoint presentation, please also provide the following documents:

- Names and addresses of two referees who know you well. This may be a previous or current employer, neighbour, head teacher or a previous volunteering project. Please note that a referee cannot be a relative.
